#### THEME — AFTERNOON TEA — a Victorian invention

This event celebrates an important tradition. Afternoon tea is a British food tradition of sitting down for an afternoon treat of tea, sandwiches, scones, and cake. Afternoon tea is served around 4 p.m. When afternoon tea became fashionable in the early 19th century thanks to Anna, the Duchess of Bedford, it was never intended to replace dinner but rather to fill in the long gap between lunch and dinner at a time when dinner was served as late as 8 p.m. Some research regarding portion size, table setting, and arrangement of items is suggested.

- 1 vintage crockery assortment including a pretty teapot, milk jug, sugar bowl, 2 cups, saucers, and plates
- 1 savoury baked item, e.g. mini muffins
- 1 sweet baked item, plain, e.g. biscuits
- 1 sweet baked item, iced, e.g. a slice or mini cupcakes
- 1 suitable floral decoration in a vase of the era
- 1 sheet of music of a Victorian song (download from the internet, print on suitable paper and stain using a teabag)
- 1 book e.g. classic novel, family Bible **OR**
- 1 black and white or sepia-toned photograph of a group in vintage dress
- 1 small (e.g. card) table with a suitable cloth

#### SECTION O — CREATE AND PARADE (MAKE 'N' MODEL)

Introducing the "Create and Parade" challenge — participants choose a design from 1660 to 1925 to make their outfit. Take inspiration from films such as:

Outlander, Poldark, Pride and Prejudice, Brigerton, My Lady Jane, and Downton Abbey, etc.

On your entry form state which era you are entering, e.g., Edwardian, etc.

Fabric can be expensive so you are encouraged to recycle items for your costume (duvet covers and curtains can be useful). Check out Op shops (particularly useful for fabric for male garments — coats, pants, jackets, shirts) and fabric sales. You can mix existing patterns to achieve the desired look. Use modern sewing aids, e.g. zips, buttons, interfacing, etc.

You can have another person model your creation, but it's the creator who gets the credit. Consider children's sizes for less expense.

Consider shoes (no stilettos in the Hall), and no wristwatch.

See Pinterest and YouTube for ideas, patterns, accessories (optional).

Involve family and friends — the more, the merrier!
